2024 Seedling Descriptions

White Spruce: Grows to 50 ft. Extremely hardy evergreen with short blueish– green needles. This spruce thrives in well drained or moist soil. This tree is unique because it can endure heat and drought better than others. A rapid grower. Makes a beautiful Christmas/ornamental tree, when planted alone or a stately windbreak when planted in a row.

Norway Spruce: One of the fastest growing spruces with needles less than one inch long. Good for windbreaks and timber potential. This spruce thrives in average soil conditions, but prefers moisture in the soil to maintain its deep green color.

Douglas Fir: Fast growing. Grows to 60 feet. Short, soft Blue-green needles, Grows best in moist, well drained soil. Will not do well in heavy, wet, clay soil. Largest timber producing tree in North America. A popular Christmas tree because of color, symmetrical form and needle retention.

American Redbud: Height 20 to 30 feet. Spread 25 to 35 feet. Flowers are perfect reddish-purple in bud, opening in to a rosy-pink with purplish tinged in early spring. Large, dark green, heart shaped leaves 3 to 5 inches long and wide. Leaves change to yellow in the fall.

Black Gum: Also know as black tupelo. Height 30-50 feet. Produces intense red fall color with hues of orange, yellow, and purple, which makes it a wonderful selection for home landscapes. Prefers moist, well-drained soils, black gum will grow on drier sites, giving it some drought tolerance.

Persimmon: A native tree 25 to 40 feet in height and 20 to 35 feet in width. Persimmon is slender with an oval-rounded crown, often very symmetrical. The white, fragrant flowers are very sweet and a favorite of honeybees. An edible persimmon ripens with a deep orange color after several frosts. More than one tree is needed for pollination to produce fruit. Persimmon tends to sucker into groves or colonies, producing food for wildlife.

Pawpaw: A deciduous, often narrow conical tree growing 12 to 25 feet in height and less broad. Dense, dangling foliage giving the papa an interesting tropical appearance. The large edible fruit is produced, often in clusters from the blooms. Fruit is oblong shaped and light green in color. Harvest time is mid August to mid October. Plant at least two trees for fruit production to ensure cross pollination.

Buttonbush: Also known as Button Willow or Honey Bells. Mature Height 5 to 12 ft; spread 5 to 8 feet. Definitely a wetland shrub. Thrives in wet, low lying areas. Blooms July and August with cream colored flowers that develop into nutlet type fruits remaining into the winter.

American Elderberry: Large, spreading, multi-stemmed shrub with large, flat-topped white flowers in June - July followed by purple-black berries. Can be used for jellies, pies and wine. Excellent for attracting birds, and will grow in wet areas. Grows in most types of soil and is very hardy.

Arrowwood Viburnum: Blooms from May to early June, with clusters of creamy white flowers that produce a Blue-black berry. Grows to a height of 6'-15'. Provides food, cover, and nesting sites for birds. Prefers full sun, partial sun/shade and a wide range of soil types.

Northeast Annual & Perennial Wildflower Mix: Majority of this mix reaches 2-5ft at maturity. This colorful mix will provide up to five years of color, and attracts a variety of birds and butterflies.

Butterfly and Hummingbird Garden Mix: Majority of this mix reaches 3-4 ft at maturity. This of native and naturalized wildflowers and grasses in designed to attract nectar– loving pollinators such as native bees, insects, and humming birds.
